Appraising Music
Throughout year 11 we continue with theory and Areas of Study ready for your exam at the end of the course.

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Game Music
Developing composition techniques, harmonisation, and music technology.

Appraising Music
Throughout year 10 we learn about the music theory and Areas of Study required for your appraising examination.

Free Brief Composition
Learning about and completing your first GCSE composition (composing to your own brief).

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Pachelbel's Canon
Performing your own arrangement of this well known piece and Ground Bass.

Sequencing Part 3
Creating a detailed arrangement of a popular piece of music.

Eye of the Tiger
Developing ensemble and solo rehearsal skills, interpretation, arranging, ensemble performance skills.

Performing Skills for GCSE Music
Introducing GCSE performance skills and starting two years of developing solo and ensemble pieces.

Song writing
Developing composition techniques, harmonisation, music technology. [Hmwk: research task](#)

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African Music
Exploring fusions through GCSE style analysis and performance. Whole class performance.

12 Bar Blues
Developing composition and technology skills through 12 bar blues. [Hmwk: Research task](#)

In The Shallow End
Exploring ensemble skills, developing performance techniques and musicality.

Sequencing Part 2
Theory through keyboard, performance and arrangement skills.

Ramix
Exploring Baroque Music through reworking Tocata and Fugue – creative skills.

Brotherhood of Breath (Jazz)
Developing performance skills, chords and improvisation.

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Reggae
Learning to play together as a band. Understanding chords, keys and notation.

Film Music
Creating music to fit a mood / atmosphere using DAW. Listening and appraising.

Axis of Awesome
Developing performance skills using L, V, vi, W progression. Singing in parts.

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Sequencing Part One
Exploring music sequencing using a DAW, reading notation, recording and arrangements.

Orchestral Skills
Performing "In The Hall of the Mountain King" as an orchestra. Perform, listen and appraise. [Hmwk: Research a composer](#)

Musique Concrete
Elements of music. Creating music using everyday sounds. Listening to 20th C Art music.

Welcome to Music!
Whole class ensemble – "Liza Sleeps Tonight". Playing, singing and listening.

BECKET KEYS MUSIC

Key Stage 3

Intent (based on the National Curriculum)

Students should perform, listen to and evaluate music across a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions including the works of great composers and musicians. They should learn to sing and to use their voices, to create and compose music on their own and with others, can learn a musical instrument and to use technology appropriately. Students should understand and explore how music is created, produced and communicated including through the inter-related dimensions: pitch, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, structure and appropriate musical notations.

Implementation

Students will be taught to:

- play and perform confidently in a range of solo and ensemble contexts using their voice, playing instruments musically, fluently and with accuracy and expression
- improvise and compose; and extend and develop musical ideas by drawing on a range of musical structures, styles, genres and traditions
- use staff and other relevant notations appropriately and accurately in a range of musical styles, genres and traditions
- identify and use the inter-related dimensions of music expressively and with increasing sophistication, including use of tonalities, different types of scales and other musical devices
- listen with increasing discrimination to a wide range of music from great composers and musicians
- develop a deepening understanding of the music that they perform and to which they listen, and its history

Links to Key Stage 2

We note that there are huge differences in students' Key Stage 2 curriculum diet. However, students at Key Stage 2 are generally taught to use their voices and play musically. The Key Stage 3 RET Music curriculum extends these skills to encompass performance skills in voice and instruments by developing and developing technical and performance skills and in an understanding of the music. Pitch, duration, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, structure and appropriate musical notations are considered at Key Stage 2. The RET Key Stage 3 curriculum builds on this by extending creative composing and more in depth, regular creating and composing. Our aim is to develop a culture and foster a love for music.

Relationship to the wider Key Stage 3 Curriculum

There are extensive links with Drama, English and History departments. Our school engages in cross-curricular projects to contextualise music; to present and perform to audiences. There are links to geography and technology as students create instruments and study music and geographical movement from other cultures at Key Stage 3. There are links to dance in delivering performance, to art in terms of the similarity of vocabulary and to ICT as students begin to use tailor made computer programs to create music.

Links to KS4

All the skills practised at KS3 are represented, assessed and developed in Key Stage 4. KS3 is a natural progression. We offer the GCSE pathway for students and those that do not choose

music as an option at KS4, can continue with instrumental lessons and are included in all our ensembles.

We partner with Greater Essex Music Hub and [Essex Music Service](#) to support musical opportunities for our students including hosting the Brentwood Community Music School on a Thursday evening.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for students to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how students can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Performances at local venues including Brentwood Cathedral and The Wessex Centre.

Choirs and worship band perform at school Eucharist Services.

Regular performances at school for events such as award evenings.

Whole school production with live student band.

Students sing during collective worship.

Students have the chance to watch live performances during Enrichment Day including singer/songwriters promoting well-being.

KS4 and KS5 attend concerts including lunchtime recitals at Brentwood Cathedral and events in London.

Visiting artists and workshops (with links to Essex Music Service).

In the future
