Mrs Trebess writes:

Learning a Modern Foreign Language



This week, we held our Guided Curriculum Choices Evening for Year 9 parents and students, to help them to make important choices in terms of GCSE subjects.

For the vast majority of students, the pathway we recommend is The English Baccalaureate (or Ebacc). The Ebacc consists of a suite of academic subjects which align beautifully with our philosophy for the Key Stage

An essential part of the Ebacc is that all students must study a foreign language. We are passionate about learning languages at Becket Keys – all students have four lessons of language learning every week in Years 7 to 9, which is more than in many other schools.

So why are we so committed to students learning a language? You might be surprised to find out that in addition to improving career opportunities, as languages are increasingly important to make sure we in the UK can compete in the global market (and we study Mandarin

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and Spanish at Becket Keys because they are the most widely spoken languages, after English), learning a language can also help students to become more successful in their other subjects while at school.

This is because learning a language has cognitive benefits. In other words, it increases brain power. Intelligence is not fixed and students can improve their intelligence by thinking in different ways, much the same as they would train their muscles at the gym. Learning a language actually *increases the size of your brain!* Specifically, learning a language has been proven to be linked to improving attention span, boosting creative thinking, building multi-tasking skills, improving memory and boosting self-esteem.

So, by studying a Modern Foreign Language, students are increasing their chances of success in every subject. What's not to love about that?

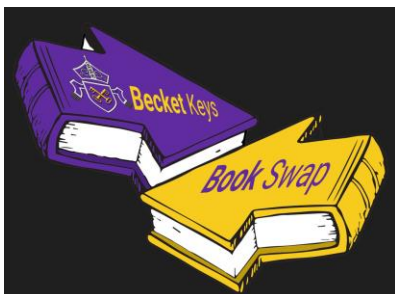
Give the Gift of Reading


So, if you feel able, why not send some books to school with your son/daughter?

Book of the Month - February



PETER LANTOS
A story of love, hope and survival

THE BOY WHO DIDN'T WANT TO DIE


This is a harrowing yet urgently necessary true story of Holocaust survival, told for those aged 11+. It is a thought-provoking book that describes Peter Lantos' childhood imprisonment in Belsen concentration camp.

A story of survival, of love between mother and son and of enduring hope in the face of unspeakable hardship, *The Boy Who Didn't Want to Die* describes an extraordinary journey, made by Peter, a boy of five, through war-torn Europe in 1944 and 1945.


Peter and his parents set out from a small Hungarian town, forced to travel through Austria and then Germany together. Along the way, unforgettable images of adventure flash one after another: sleeping in a tent and then under the sky, discovering a disused brick factory, catching butterflies in the meadows - and as Peter realises that this adventure is really a nightmare - watching bombs falling from the blue sky outside Vienna, and learning maths from his mother in while imprisoned in Belsen. All this is drawn against a background of terror, starvation, infection and, inevitably, death, before Peter and his courageous mother, who shields him from the worst horrors, can return home.

Told from a matter-of-fact child's perspective, this is a gentle and hope filled introduction to Holocaust history.

Professor Peter Lantos is a Fellow of the Academy of Medical Sciences and was an internationally renowned clinical neuroscientist. He was awarded the British Empire Medal in 2020 for 'services to Holocaust education and awareness'. He is one of the last of the generation of survivors and hopes that this - his first book for children - will serve as a testimony to his experience.

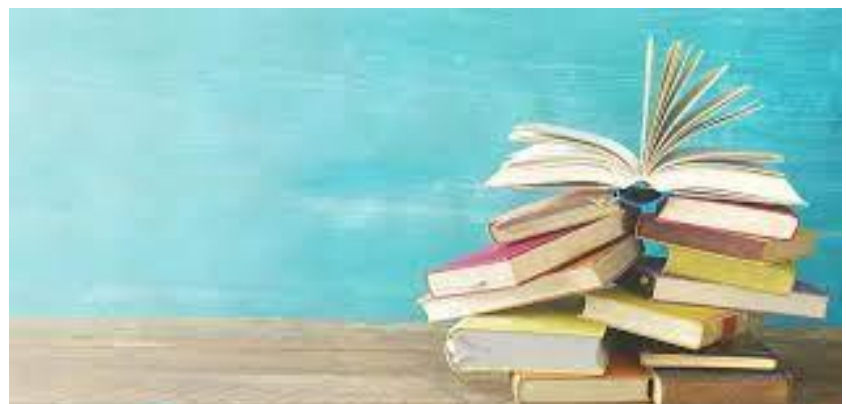

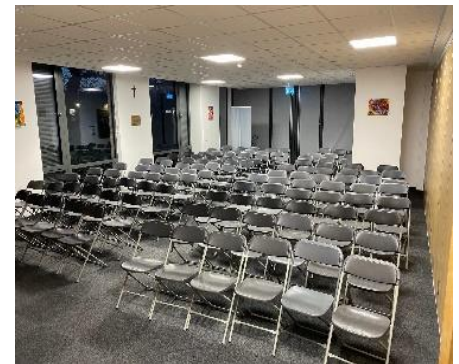
The Sports Hall

Free School Meal Vouchers Lent Holiday

Further funding for Free School Meal vouchers for the Lent period has been allocated by the local authority. As with previous holidays will be using the school voucher system, Wonde, to issue vouchers.

Parents/carers of eligible students will receive an email from Wonde next week to allow them to claim the voucher. The email will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for.

The current retailers available are Asda, Aldi, B&M, Farmfoods, M&S, Iceland, Morrisons, Sainsburys, Waitrose and Tesco. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.

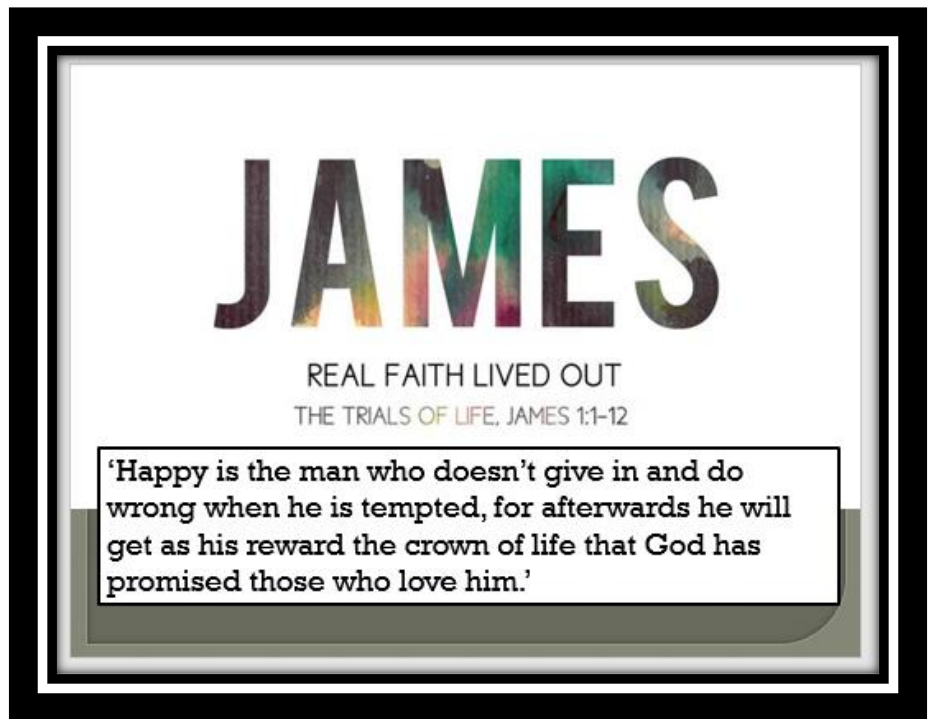

PAUSE

EVERY TEMPTATION IS
AN OPPORTUNITY TO
DO GOOD



As we prepare for Lent, we begin to think about how we will make the most of the season to develop our relationship with God and demonstrate this through the way we live our lives. Our seven school values help us to live guided by God's Word and following the example of Jesus. We show **respect** and **responsibility** by being **trustworthy, honest, caring, fair** and **forgiving**. This does not mean that living out our Christian values is easy and that we are never tempted to do the wrong thing. However, through our path to spiritual maturity, **every temptation becomes a stepping-stone, rather than a stumbling block** when we realise it is just as much an occasion to do the right thing as it is to do the wrong thing. Temptation simply provides the



choice. Every time you do the right things instead of sin, you grow in the character of Christ.

To understand this, you must **first identify the character qualities of Jesus**. One of the most concise descriptions of his character is the Fruits of the Spirit:

'When the Holy Spirit controls our lives, he will produce this kind of fruit in us: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.'
Galatians 5:22-23



How then does the Holy Spirit produce these in our lives? We do not wake one day to find ourselves fully developed with these characteristics. Fruit always matures and ripens slowly. God develops the Fruits of the Spirit, by allowing us to experience circumstances in which we are tempted to express the exact opposite quality. **Character development always involves choice and temptation provides opportunity**. For instance, God teaches us **love** by putting some unlovely people around us. It does not show character to love people who are lovely and loving to you. God teaches us real joy in the midst of sorrow, when we turn to Him. Happiness can depend on external circumstances, but **joy** is based on your relationship with God. God develops real **peace** within us, not by making things the way we planned, but by allowing times of chaos and confusion. Anyone can be peaceful watching a beautiful sunset or relaxing on holiday! We

learn real peace by choosing to trust God in circumstances in which we are tempted to worry or be afraid. Likewise, **patience** is developed in circumstances in which we are forced to wait and are tempted to be angry or have a short fuse. God uses the opposite situation of each fruit to allow us a choice. We cannot claim to be good if we have never been tempted to be bad. We cannot claim to be **faithful** if we have never had the opportunity to be unfaithful. Integrity is built by defeating the temptation to be dishonest; humility grows when we refuse to be prideful; and endurance develops every time we reject the temptation to give up.

Every time we defeat a temptation, we become more like Christ.

Understanding how temptation works is helpful, but there are three specific steps we need to take to overcome it:

Refuse to be intimidated: We should not be discouraged by it. The Bible says 'when you are tempted' not 'if'. Paul advises, 'remember that the temptations that come into your life are no different from what others experience' (1 Corinthians 10:13). It is not a sin to be tempted. Temptation is only a sin when we give in to it. Jesus himself was tempted (Mark 1:9-15, Mark 4:1-11). It is turning away from sins and believing the Good News which makes the difference!

Recognise our pattern of temptation and be prepared: There are certain situations that make us more vulnerable to

temptation than others. Some circumstances will cause us to stumble almost immediately, while others do not bother us much. These relate to where we are, the time of day, who is with us and how we feel. We need to plan for these situations or avoid them. We need to refocus our attention on something else.

Request God's help: Heaven has a twenty-four-hour emergency hotline! God wants us to ask him for assistance in overcoming temptation. He says, 'Call on me in times of trouble. I will rescue you, and you will honour me' (Psalm 50:15). This does not have to be a long conversation with God. A mini prayer, a quick call for help, is all that is needed. An S.O.S is all it takes! The Bible guarantees that our cry for help will be heard because Jesus is sympathetic to our struggle.

Remember, temptation keeps us



dependent upon God. Just as the roots grow stronger when wind blows against a tree, so every time you stand up to temptation, you become more like Jesus. When you stumble, which we all do, it is not fatal. Instead of giving in or giving up, we must look up to God, expect him to help and remember the reward that awaits us:

'When people are tempted and still continue strong, they should be happy. After they have proved their faith, God will reward them with life everlasting.'

James 1:12

Let us pray:

Dear Lord, let us believe that You will help us stand strong when we are tempted to do wrong. Give us the words and actions to do the right thing. Strengthen us, protect us and guide us so that we can be more like you.

Lord, I ask that you continue to remind us of how important it is to invite your presence daily into our lives and circumstances. We lift up to you our relationships with others. Bring these into your loving arms. Please show us the way to let go, to forgive, to set free. Protect and preserve us from all misunderstanding and miscommunication. Give us compassion and forgiveness, so that we may value and use the love that You have given us.

Lord, thank you for loving and accepting each and every one of us. You proved your love on the cross and your acceptance by filling us with your spirit. Thank you that you have welcomed us into your presence. Help us to love and accept the people you have placed in our lives. Lord thank you that, because of your love, you have already decided that through the gift of your Son that we are set free, our sins are forgiven. How great is your grace.

Amen.

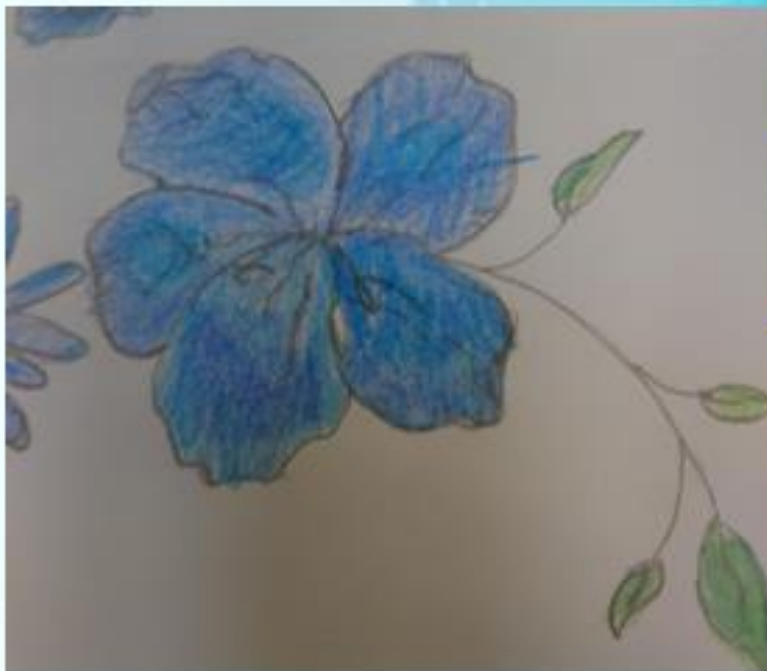

In order to combine nature and exercise why not join the Parkrun? Parkrun is a free, community event where you can walk, jog, run, volunteer or spectate. Parkrun is 5k and takes place every Saturday morning. Junior Parkrun is 2k, dedicated to 4-14 year olds, and their families, every Sunday morning.

Parkrun is positive, welcoming and inclusive, there is no time limit and no one finishes last!
