Mr Scott-Evans writes:

Dear Parents/Carers

Last week, I asked if you would be so kind as to give us your feedback using the [OfSTED Parent View](#) system. So far, we have only had 45 responses. I really would like more! Could you please log on and take 5 minutes to let us (and OfSTED) know your thoughts?

It is very encouraging to me, the other staff and our governors to get feedback from parents. It means a lot to know that you would 'recommend our school to another parent' and that you think 'your child does well at this school'. I know you do feel these things because many of you take the time to write to me and tell me! We also know because we are once again heavily over-subscribed with applications for

Year 7 places. This year we have nearly 850 applications, which is the most we have ever received. Thank you for being the best possible advert for our school! However, the benefit of using the Parent View system is that it also lets OfSTED know how proud we are of the school that we have created together. So, please do get involved today.

Another additional benefit is that there are some more nuanced questions that can help us determine our priorities for the year ahead. For example, last year we could see that some parents did not feel that we were supporting wider personal development quite as well as other areas. We hoped that with the introduction of many new clubs, trips, overseas visits, enrichment activities, careers

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advice, a rich PSHE programme, guest speakers, Eucharists, a fantastic school play and other dramatic performances, numerous musical opportunities and more competitive sport than ever before would change this. If you and your son/daughter have appreciated these opportunities for wider personal development, it would be great if you could register this on the survey (question 13)!

If you want to give a more personalised bit of feedback (and get a personal response from me) you can do that by sending me a message via the school website [here](#). I appreciate that the short 14 question survey that OfSTED use is not always enabling you to say everything that you want to say!

It would be great to get at least 150 parents responding. Last year we managed to get 126.

Free School Meal Vouchers Easter Holiday

Further funding for Free School Meal vouchers for the Easter break has been allocated by the local authority. As with previous holidays will be using the school voucher system, Wonde, to issue vouchers.

Parents and carers of eligible students will receive an email from Wonde to allow them to claim a voucher. The email will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. Parents will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where they will need to enter their details and confirm their email address before being asked to select the retailer from which to receive a voucher.

The current retailers available are Asda, Aldi, B&M, Farmfoods, M&S, Iceland, Morrisons, Sainsburys, Waitrose and Tesco. Parents will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store. If parents have not received the voucher by Wednesday 29th March, they should contact the school at office@becketkeys.org

Many thanks to Mr Gunn who spoke about 'Faith in Learning', all the helpers who made sure the evening ran smoothly and our amazing musicians.



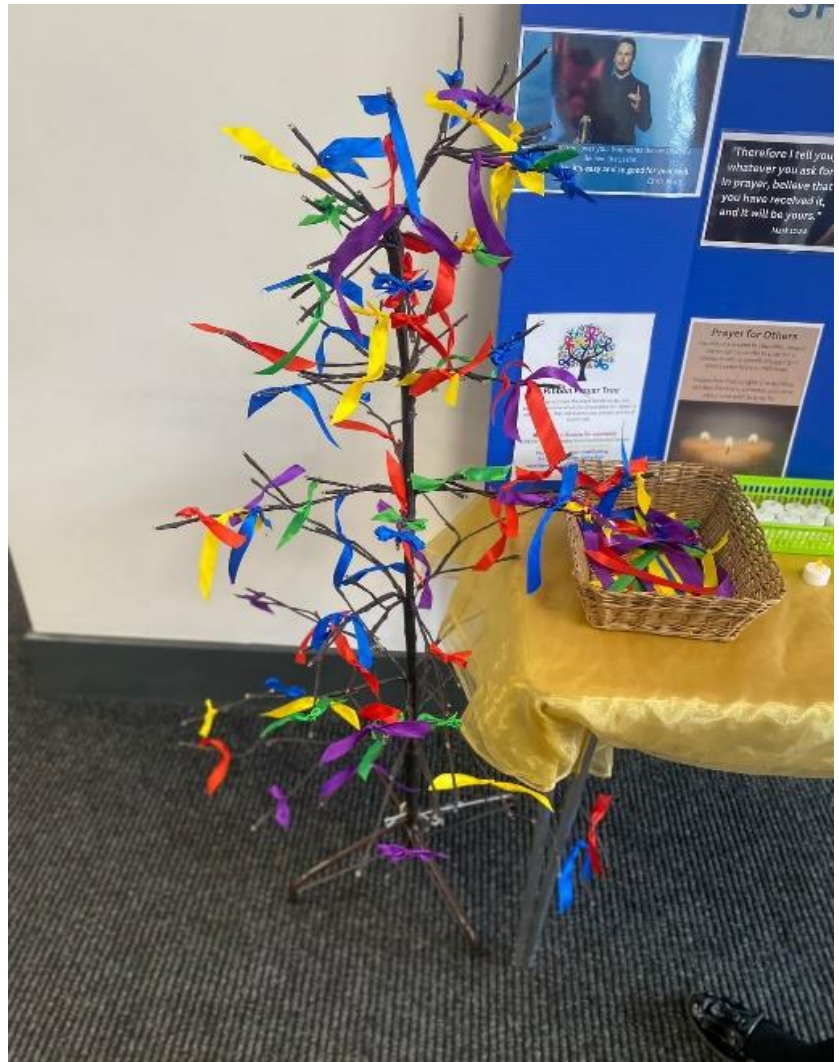
Sixth Form Pop-up Prayer Space

It has been a pleasure to be part of the ministry team for 6th form for several years now. We conduct worship throughout the year but had an idea to bring something alongside these sessions to allow the students to engage with ideas and thoughts on spirituality in a different way.

Our latest collective worship was on the theme of prayer - its purpose, what it looks like and whether there is any point to prayer. After this, we set up a pop-up prayer space in the foyer near the chapel with activities related to this topic. There was a tree where they could tie ribbons, each colour representing a different theme: red for war, yellow for cost-of-living crisis, blue for equality, purple for human trafficking and green for climate issues. There was also a prayer wall, where students could write private prayers, posting them through the cracks like the wall in Jerusalem and finally candles, which could be lit on behalf of prayers for others.

By the end of the week there were 110 ribbons on the tree and lots of private prayers collected in the wall. We look forward to bringing another interactive prayer space to the 6th form soon.

Year 10 MEP Mandarin Birmingham Trip

“We finally got to travel!”



Our current Year 10 Mandarin cohort is Becket Keys' first ever MEP group. Due to the pandemic, they were unable to visit China. This year, the MEP organisations organised a national conference in Birmingham, giving students an amazing opportunity to meet over 1400 year 10 students face to face from over 70 MEP schools!



The theme for this conference was “Journey to the East”. The theme has dual meanings: it references one of China's most classical literatures – “Journey to the West”; at the same time, it conveys a symbolic meaning that we are embarking on a journey to China and Chinese culture.

Our trip started on the afternoon of 28th March. After checking in to the hotel, we went to a Chinese buffet, where students feasted on all sorts of gourmet Chinese dishes. Many students tried new dishes that they had never had the opportunity to



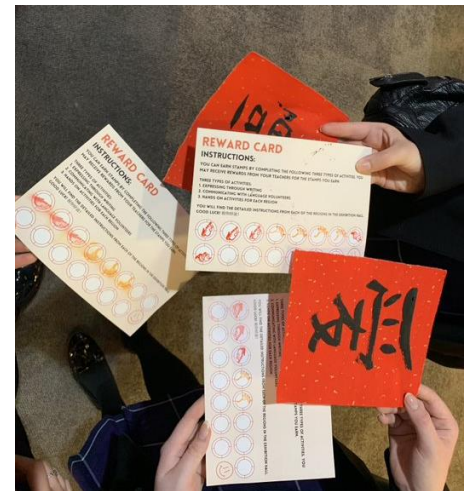
before. Because we studied “food and diet” this term, students were able to name the platters in Chinese. What a lovely application of their language knowledge!



The day of the conference started with a wonderful greeting from the Minister for Schools Standards – Rt. Hon Nick Gibb MP. Then we had a panel of two speakers giving lectures on the history between the UK and China and the “mysterious” Chinese politics. These were intriguing topics for our students as they had not had enough

exposure and discussion before; one of our students had taken copious notes on their phone!

Lunch was again full of delicious food. Whilst waiting and resting, students attended different workshops such as Taichi, Chinese instruments, calligraphy and paper cutting, etc., where they could collect stamps in exchange for gifts afterwards.



The afternoon was full of highlights. We had heard thoughts from current university students using Chinese; we had also very much enjoyed the sharing from employees using

Chinese in their career, including a couple of people from the secret service and an intelligence institution!



We then had the most interesting session where speakers introduced internet fictions, Chinese animation, and Chinese music. They interested the students so much that some of them have started to use the suggested websites then and there to investigate them more.



Transition also judged a Chinese Song Writing Competition this year. Although we did not win the competition, our Year 9 and Year 8 entries were given an honourable mention.



"This was a lot more fun than we expected!" said students. This event has surely enriched our enthusiasm in learning Chinese and about China. We look forward to the upcoming university day trip!"

The event culminated with a mini-concert from Transition, an English rock indie band from Bristol who write and sing many Chinese songs. Over a thousand students turned on the lights on their phones and swayed with the music; it was truly a phenomenal sight!

IET Faraday Challenge

On the 29th of March, six Year 8 students visited Brentwood School for the IET Faraday Challenge Day.

This is a national STEM challenge encouraging students to devise a creative solution to a future need. This challenge was based around the future of flight, with new technologies being developed to make air travel more accessible with electric aircraft, drones and planes which can take off vertically.

Students had to design and build a prototype which could be developed by the Future Flight Challenge Team. Our students had to learn how to create series and parallel circuits using LEDs, motors, buzzers and solar panels. They had to record their design process and the progress they made as well as account for the resources they used by 'buying' equipment and parts they needed to create their design. At the end of the session, they did a short presentation to explain their engineering work to the other groups and answer questions on how it works. This is our first team to enter this challenge and the students should be proud of themselves representing the school and all our Christian values.


World Book Day Book Tokens



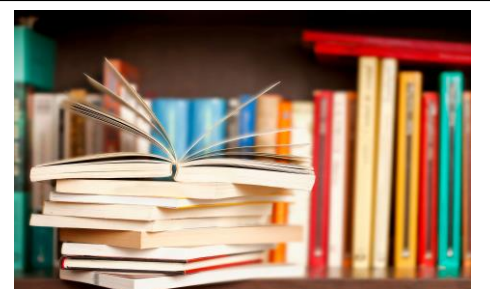
Ms. Stone & Mrs Walker recommend...

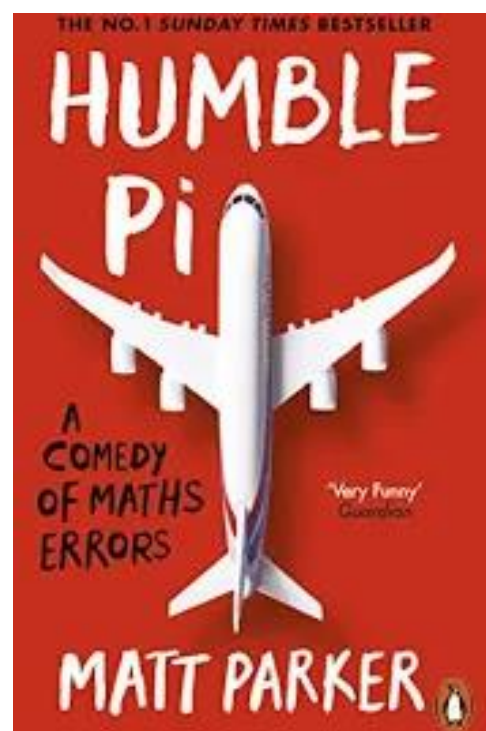
This month the Year 8s have been reading an excerpt from 'Millions' in form time. This is a comedic novel that tells the story of what happens when two children find millions of pounds! If you enjoy this genre, here are some of my recommended reads!



Jamie Grimm is a middle schooler on a mission: he wants to become the world's greatest standup comedian--even if he doesn't have a lot to laugh about these days. He's new in town and stuck living with his aunt, uncle, and their evil son Stevie, a bully who doesn't let Jamie's wheelchair stop him from messing with Jamie as much as possible. But Jamie doesn't let his situation get him down. When his Uncle Frankie mentions a contest called The Planet's Funniest Kid Comic, Jamie knows he has to enter. But are the judges only rewarding him out of pity because of his wheelchair, like Stevie suggests? Will Jamie ever share the secret of his troubled past instead of hiding behind his comedy act?

A collection of mathematical mistakes that result in disastrous or funny outcomes.

As Matt Parker shows us, our modern lives are built on mathematics: computer programmes, finance, engineering. And most of the time this maths works quietly behind the scenes, until ... it doesn't. Exploring and explaining a litany of glitches, near-misses and mishaps involving the internet, big data, elections, street signs, lotteries, the Roman empire and a hapless Olympic shooting team, Matt Parker shows us the bizarre ways maths trips us up, and what this reveals about its essential place in our world.



God's Easter Promise for You

'By his power God raised the Lord from the dead, and he will raise us also.'

1 Corinthians 6:14

'For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.'

John 3:16

This is the last Biblical Pause before the holidays, so it makes sense to focus on the importance of Easter. Millions and millions of Christians around the world celebrate Easter every year. However, for far too many of us the story has become routine. We have the basic facts: Jesus was arrested. He was crucified. And three days later, God raised him

from the dead.

Secular/commercial celebrations may also dominate. Easter eggs have their place in celebrating Easter day, but they lose their symbolism when they are eaten from New Year's Day onwards!

We can so easily miss something very important by not engaging fully in the Easter story. We can miss what makes Easter a transforming way of life. The story of the Resurrection is not just Jesus' story, *it is our story as well*. We are a part of the Resurrection. Jesus' death and Resurrection did not just prove there was life after death. The Resurrection proves **you** can have life after death, that there is life beyond *your* grave. Jesus says, if you trust in him, death becomes a transition, not an ending point. God made you to last forever! Through Jesus' sacrifice for us upon the cross more than 2,000 years ago, we have hope and the

promise of eternal life. This is the promise of Easter.

Consider the words of this hymn:

Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine!

O what a foretaste of glory divine!

Heir of salvation, purchase of God,

Born of His Spirit, washed in His blood.

This is my story, this is my song,

Praising my Saviour, all the day long;

This is my story, this is my song,

Praising my Saviour all the day long.

This is our story, this is our song! Let our lives be touched by Jesus' love and be transformed by His love. As Jesus promised in blessing and sending out His disciples, He is with us always, to the end of the age.

Reflection:

- Why do you think the story of Jesus' Resurrection grows stale for many believers?
- How does internalising "the promise of Easter" transform how you live your life?
- How can you help others understand how they can have eternal life through Jesus' Resurrection this Easter season?

I pray that we will all be with Jesus in thought and prayer throughout the remaining days of Lent and into Holy Week, as he demonstrates His total love for us. May we live in the wonder of this goodness and marvel at his endless grace forever. May we see the cross in the light of Easter, as the place where the glory of God shines out. May we and our families be blessed as we celebrate the true meaning of Easter; from the reflection of Holy Week and Good Friday to the joy of Easter Sunday. May we rejoice in the promise of eternal life.

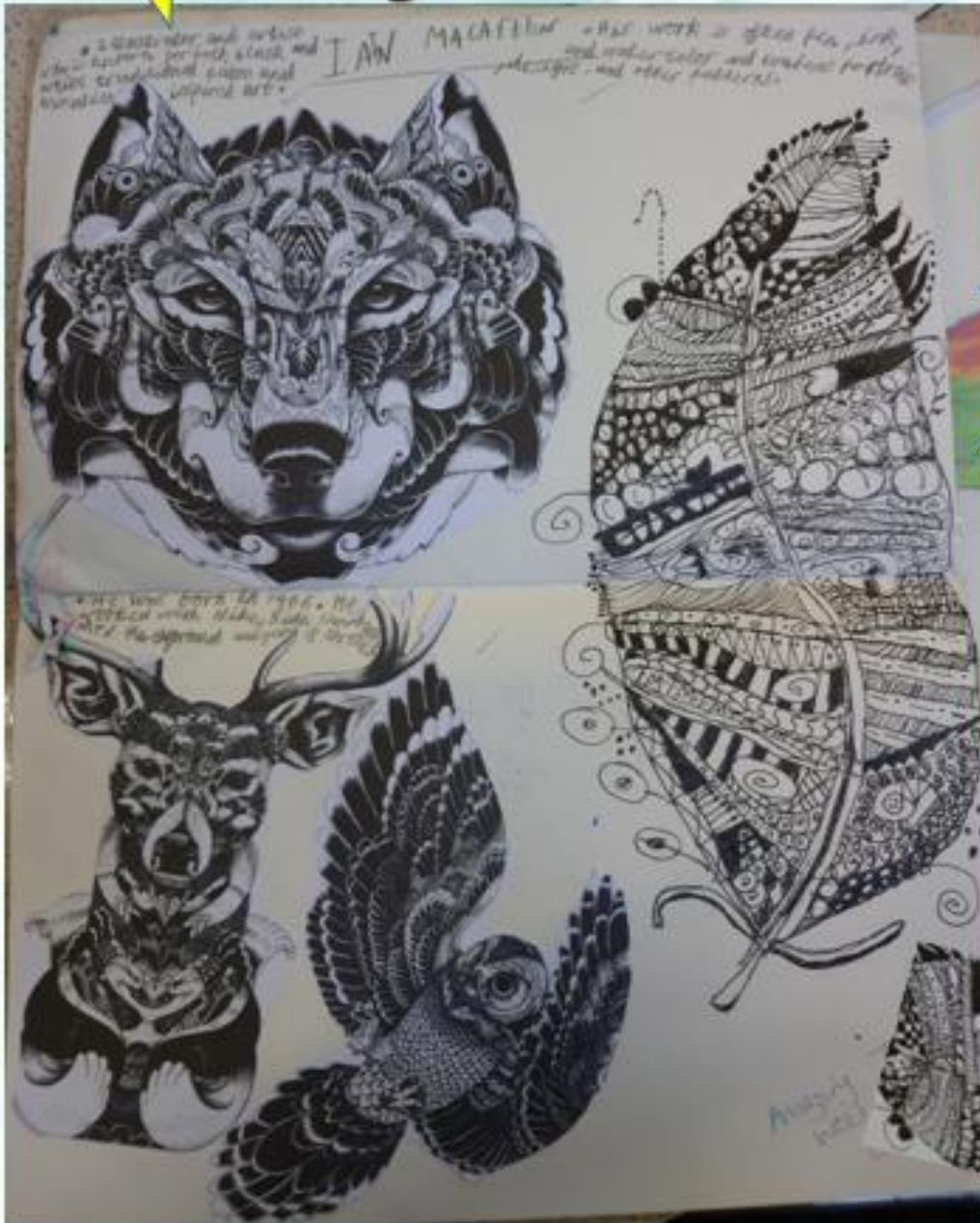

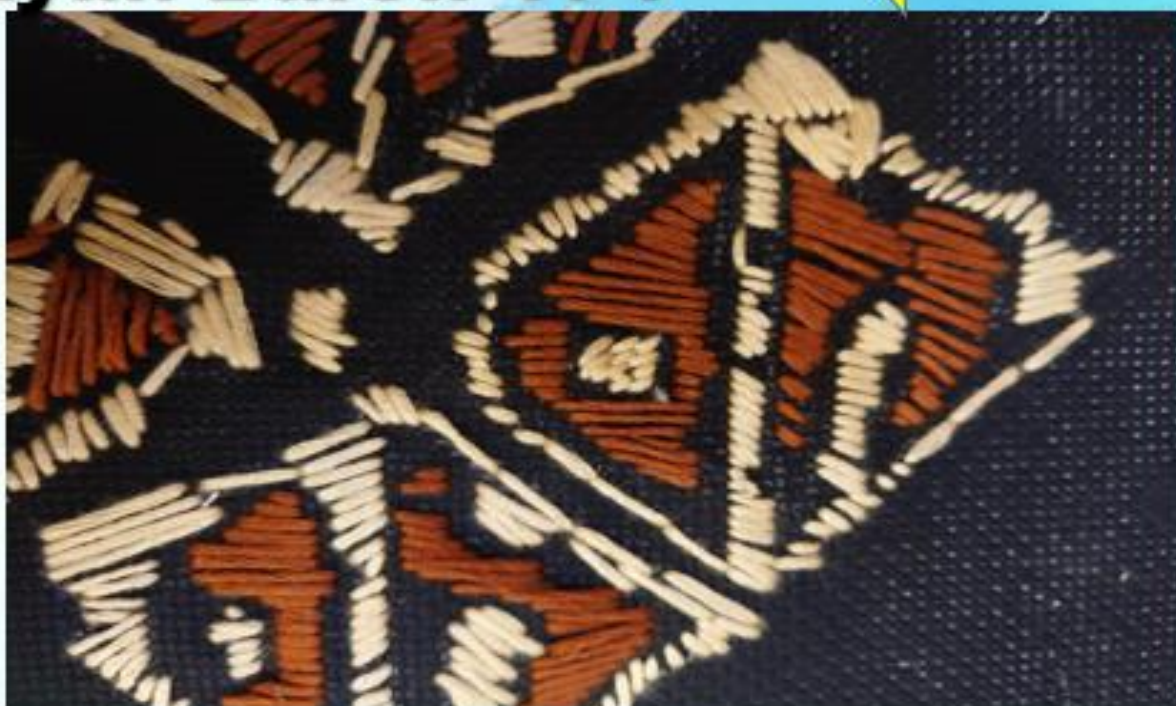

Surrealism is a art style used by artists to portray human experiences through both rational and irrational visions of life. The beauty of this technique is that it has no limits to the imagination.

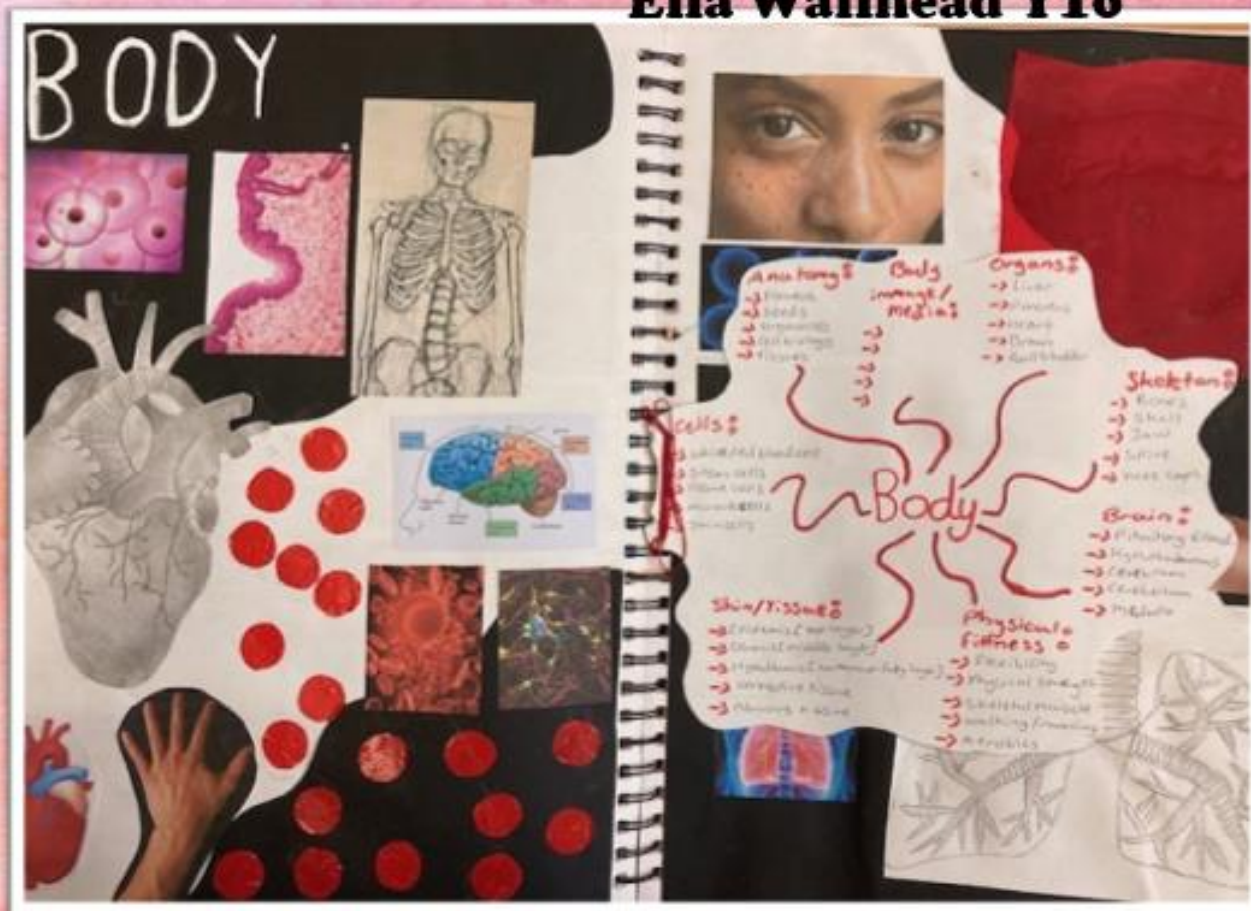

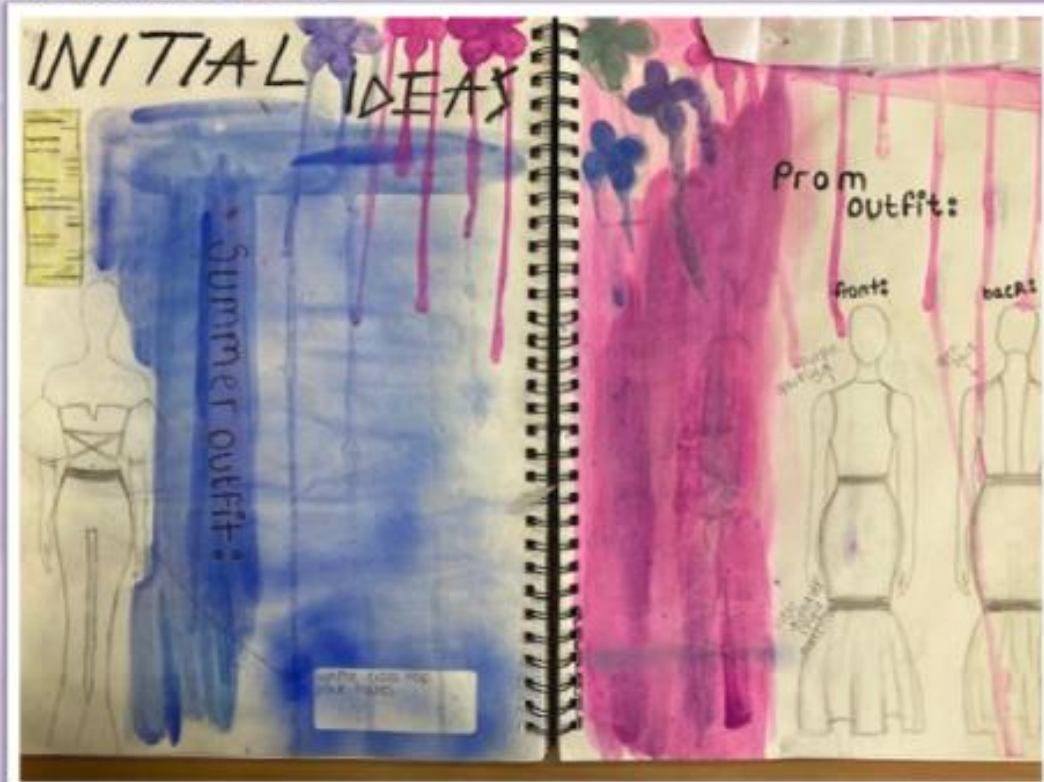
