# Preparing for Remembrance Day



This week, our worship has offered a poignant reminder of the importance of preparing our hearts and minds as we approach next week's Remembrance Day. As we reflect on the words of

Micah 6:8 (NIV), "What does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God," we are called to honour those who have sacrificed for peace.

In the face of tragedy, neglect, and disaster—whether through war or terror—it is essential to lament the loss of lives and communities. This collective mourning can transform our individual pain into a shared commitment to create a better world. By engaging with scripture, particularly the psalms of lament, we can deepen our sensitivity to the sufferings of others and cultivate hope. This journey toward understanding justice, peace, and reconciliation requires not only courage and vision, but also the humility to listen and be transformed.

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#### **Enrichment Day**

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
The poppy, which flourishes in battle-scarred fields, symbolises remembrance and hope. Adopted by the Royal British Legion, these delicate yet resilient flowers thrive even amidst chaos and destruction. The bright red Flanders poppy (Papaver rhoeas) inspired Lieutenant

Colonel John McCrae's famous 1915 poem, "In Flanders Fields," which serves as a powerful reminder of the sacrifices made:

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders' fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe; To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high, If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders' Fields.



Let us remember all service personnel who have served in conflicts throughout history, both past and present. Let us also remember the ongoing need for peace and justice. May we strive to "act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God." The torch of remembrance and responsibility is now in our hands, urging us to honour their sacrifices while actively working towards a more compassionate future.

### Let us pray:

God of infinite compassion, grant us the strength to seek healing, justice, and peace for all. Help us listen to the voices of the marginalised and those who feel excluded. May we pursue tolerance amid our differences for the sake of your kingdom. Amen.

Elevate's study skills workshops and seminars are designed to achieve behavioural change amongst students. It isn't enough that students simply understand what they need to do in their study: the challenge in any study skills programme is getting students to use and apply the skills they learn. Elevate gets students using the skills from its seminars and workshops through an integrated process that works.

This was an interactive session, comparing techniques with other classmates, preparing students on how to navigate stress and time management in the period coming up to exam season.

## Blencathra 2024



The A-Level Geographers have recently returned from the Lake District National park and the fabulous Blencathra mountain and field studies centre.

The annual Year 13 fieldtrip is a chance for the students to witness firsthand the geography and splendour of the Fells whilst collecting their primary data for their NEA (Non-examined assessment). This piece of work accounts for 20% of our overall A-Level Geography grade and is a great stepping stone towards their next steps after Becket Keys. The students practice and apply a range of skills and presentation techniques in producing a 4,500+ word project on a topic of their choice.

As part of the fieldtrip the students enjoyed visiting and exploring: the human geography of Keswick, climbed Cat Bells, saw Scotland across the Soloway Firth, studied sand dunes and the heavily managed coastal settlement of Siloth. We were blessed with the weather and had a jolly good time as well as making new friends and learning new things. Thank you to all those involved and the staff who made this fieldtrip possible and a memorable experience.
