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Reflections on Andrew Hampton's Inspiring Talk: "Working with Boys"

Last night, Becket Keys was privileged to host Andrew Hampton, author of "Working with Boys," for an enlightening and engaging talk aimed at parents and teachers. With over 100 parents in attendance, the event was a resounding success, leaving everyone with valuable insights and practical advice on fostering positive masculinity among our teenage boys.


Andrew Hampton's presentation was both thought-provoking and heartwarming. He began by highlighting the unique qualities that boys bring to their families and communities. From their boundless energy and bravery to their loyalty and sense of humour, boys possess a range of admirable traits that, when nurtured correctly, can lead to the development of strong, positive male identities.

One of the key messages from Andrew's talk was the importance of understanding what boys truly want. He emphasised that boys seek social connection, respect from their peers, and the opportunity to be good at something. They also desire to be seen as worthy and to have a sense of autonomy. By recognising and supporting these needs, parents can help their sons thrive.

Andrew provided practical advice on how parents can meet these

needs more effectively. He stressed the importance of being non-judgmental and accepting boys as they are. He also highlighted the need for parents to be protective and supportive, while also encouraging their sons to take risks and embrace their sense of adventure. By negotiating online time and respecting their sons' need for social connection, parents can help their boys balance their digital lives with real-world interactions.



To foster meaningful conversations at home, Andrew suggested parents prompt their sons with questions that are relevant to them, such as:

- "Tell me about your friends – how are they doing?"
- "What was the best thing that happened to you today? Was it a) something to do with a teacher, b) something a mate did or said, or c) something else?"

- "Apart from lunch and coming home, which are the parts of the day you most look forward to?"
- "If each of your teachers was an animal, what would they be?"

He also advised parents to avoid lecturing, humiliating through teasing, and judging. Instead, parents should listen actively and validate their sons' experiences with affirmations like, "That sounds really tough for you." Asking permission before offering advice is crucial, as it shows respect for their autonomy.

Andrew emphasised the importance of affirmations and showing love in various ways, including words of affirmation, physical touch, gifts, quality time, and acts of service. He reminded parents that their children want them to be close but also respectful of their space, to acknowledge their experimental identities, and to guide them without becoming over-involved.

The talk also delved into the dynamics of boys' friendships. Andrew explained that boys often form larger, less clearly defined groups and tend to resolve conflicts quickly without seeking adult intervention. Understanding these dynamics can help parents and teachers support boys in navigating their social worlds more effectively.

One of the most impactful parts of the evening was Andrew's discussion on the qualities that make boys truly remarkable. He spoke about their sincerity, loyalty, and ability to find humour in almost anything. He also touched on their focus and retentive memory when it comes to their passions, whether it's football, online games, or other interests. By recognising and celebrating these qualities, we can help boys feel valued and understood.

In conclusion, Andrew Hampton's talk was a powerful reminder of the importance of creating a supportive and nurturing environment for our boys. By understanding their unique needs and qualities, we can help them grow into confident, compassionate, and resilient young men. We are grateful to Andrew for sharing his wisdom and look forward to implementing his advice in our school community.

Charity Update - I Got Shoes


A Message from 'I Got Shoes'

One of our P7 students, who just passed her PLE exams with a Second Division, had to leave her family and school and was sent to work as a maid in the neighbouring town. Not only this, we learned any small earnings would also be returned to the guardian looking after her, it would not even be for her to keep.

I thought to myself, "Lord, she is only 15." I have five granddaughters and could not imagine this being their destiny. Surely, this young girl must have some say in her future?

Later that week, we met with the headteacher of our local secondary school. As we shared the situation, disbelief washed over us all. We wondered, what we could do to help. While we felt compassion, caution also crept in. Our friend suggested, "Even though it feels pretty set, let's pray the guardian's heart will be moved." Typically, a guardian will have the final say. Again, the hard truth hitting us is that their culture dictates gender roles and rights. So, we prayed.

We asked our **I GOT SHOES** team in Uganda to begin liaising with the family and offered a scholarship for her to study and help with any extra needs. *To our*



ecstatic joy, he agreed. She is now in secondary education learning academic, vocational, and spiritual truths to build a strong foundation for her life.

Luke 1: 79 ... Jesus came, "To shine on those living in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the path of peace."


